

# OVERVIEW

ousehold Economy Analysis (HEA) and IPC reports, 2022, indicated that 20% of Malawi's Population would be food insecure from October 2022 to March 2023. This meant that children would be at risk of malnutrition and other negative outcomes caused by negative coping mechanisms that families may employ in attempt to meet their food needs. Our AA provided cash assistance ahead of the lean season to families to enable them to stockpile food and protect livelihoods.





- Consistent tracking of trigger indicators, comprehensive data and analysis is key for success
- Timely activation of AA when trigger thresholds have been met is a critical success factor
- Timely resource mobilization ensures timely implementation

## CHALLENGES

- The project started in Aug and although it succeeded, it could have been a huge success if it had started in June 2022
- There was inconsitent data collection and analysis and this affected projections
- The project failed to set realistic trigger threshholds
